ORDINANCE DESIGNATING LANDMARK

ORDINANCE NO. 386-81

COESIGNATING THE SAVINGS UNION BRANCH OF THE SECURITY PACIFIC NATIONAL BANK AS A LANDMARK FURNIANT TO ARTICLE 10 OF THE CITY PLANNING CODE.

Be it Ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. The Soard of Supervisors hereby finds that The Savings Union branch of the Security Pacific National Bank located at 1 Grant Avenue, being Lot 8 in Assessor's block 3:3, has special character and special historical, architectural and aesthetic interest and value, and that its designation as a Landmark will be in furtherance or and in conformance with the purposes of Article 10 of the City Planning Code and the standards set forth therein.

- (a) Designation. Pursuant to Section 1004 of the City Planning Code, Chapter II. Part 11 of the San Francisco Municipal Code, I Grant Avenue, The Savings Union branch of Security Pacific National Bank is hereby designated as a Landmark, this designation having been duly approved by Resolution No. 8901 of the City Planning Commission, which Resolution is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors under File No. 9/-8/-8.
- (b) Required Data. The descriptions of the location and boundaries of the Landmark site; of the characteristics of the Landmark which justify its designation; and of the particular features that should be preserved; as included in the said Resolution, are hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof as though fully set forth.

WHEREAS, A proposal to designate the Savings Union Branch of the Security Pacific National Bank at One Grant Avenue as a Landmark pursuant to the provisions of Article 10 of the City Planning Code was initiated by the Landmarks Preservation Advisory Board on March 4, 1981, and said Advisory Board, after due consideration, has recommended approval of this proposal; and

WHEREAS, The City Planning Commission, after due notice given, held a public hearing on April 9, 1981 to consider the proposed designation and the report of said Advisory Board; and

WHEREAS, The Commission believes that the proposed Landmark has a special character and special historical, architectural and aesthetic interest and value; and that the proposed designation would be in furtherance of and in conformance with the purposes and standards of the said Article 10:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, First, the proposal to designate the aforementioned structure, the Savings Union Branch of the Security Pacific National Bank at One Grant Avenue, as a Landmark pursuant to Article 10 of the City Planning Code is hereby APPROVED, the precise location and boundaries of the Landmark site being those of Lot 8 in Assessor's Block 313;

Second, That the special character and special historical, architectural and aesthetic interest and value of the said Landmark justifying its designation are set forth in the Landmarks Preservation Advisory Board Resolution No. 212 as adopted on March 4, 1981, which Resolution is incorporated herein and made a part thereof as though fully set forth;

Third, That the said Landmark should be preserved generally in all of its particular exterior features as existing on the date hereof and as described and depicted in the photographs, case report and other material on file in the Department of City Planning Docket No. LM81.3;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Commission hereby directs its Secretary to transmit the proposal for designation, with a copy of this Resolution, to the Board of Supervisors for appropriate action.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

(Describe special CHARACTER, or special HISTORICAL, ARCHITECTURAL or AESTHETIC interest or value:) Originally the Savings Union Bank of San Francisco. An example of what the "Architect and Engineer" called the first period of Bliss and Faville's work characterized by an "enthusiasm for the antique" and an interest in the work of McKim, Mead and White, in whose office both architects had apprenticed, its greatest importance lies in its function, together with the Wells Fargo Bank across the street as a gateway to Grant Avenue and together with the flatiron Phelan Building and other immediate neighbors, as part of a splendid group of contemporary designs. This gateway to Grant Avenue is altogether, perhaps the best of the remaining older Market Street intersections, and a suitably grand entrance to a street which comes closer than any other to embodying the ideals of the City Beautiful Movement. In composition, the building is a modified temple derived from the Roman Pantheon. Its steel frame is clad in granite and surmounted by a reinforced concrete dome. The main Grant Avenue facade is formed by a pedimented Ionic Temple front with a bas relief of Liberty by Haig Pattigan. The bronze (may be continued on back) (Over)

- 7) Among Bliss and Faville's works are the St. Francis Hotel, the Bank of California, and the University Club.
- 8) In 1910, it merged with the San Francisco Savings and Loan Society and became the Savings Union Bank and Trust Company. In 1920, this entity merged with the Mercantile Trust Company of California. In 1927, this company merged with the American Bank of San Francisco to form the American Trust Company, which in turn was absorbed by Wells Fargo Bank in 1960. Security Pacific National Bank purchased the 1 Grant Avenue structure and maintains a branch in the building.
